

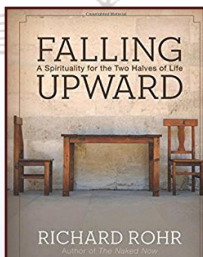

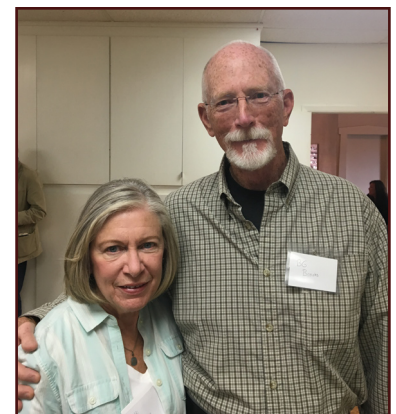
During his message – if memory serves – Hansen went on to say that his interpretation of God's love and His desire for our lives is to not have us live in guilt of the past and fear of the future, but in hope. Hope that is rooted in Him and hopefully is apparent to others in our everyday lives.

I might be getting carried away here on a specific sermon and theme, but it was a big part of our introduction to NCPC and, after hearing subsequent sermons and meeting NCPC members, we decided to join the church last summer.

CREDO

Last month Hansen went to a conference for professional development and spiritual renewal. CREDO (Latin for 'I believe') is a program that over 1000 Presbyterian pastors have completed, to help understand or reframe their sense of identity and faith, vocational skills and purpose, as well as mental, physical and financial health. Perhaps the line that best captures my experience of that week is the charge to focus on "softening my edges and strengthening my core." So, I come back with some ways to re-order my personal life toward more peace and grace, as well as some goals and methods for improving my ministry and the life of this congregation.

One lesson I keep coming back to is how to work wiser, not harder. To that end, I'll be trying to take some better control of my schedule, and with the help of our Session, delegating some responsibilities, or just dropping some projects. I'll be spending more morning time for meditative walks and reading, taking a weekly mid-day break for yoga, and honoring my Sabbath—all of which means you may miss me at the office a bit or not get email responses on Saturdays. If I can model any good behavior (that would be a first!), may it strengthen your own core and soften your own edges. If it's a hassle, just know that this process and the many small changes that pastors bring back, tends to have really good long-term effects on churches.

Help me out, if you would, with some prayers, patience, and maybe even some accountability, that I maintain energy and grow in love.
