Why I Love This Church





Dec 24, 6 pm – Cookie Pot Luck – Whether you're coming to the early or late service, bring your favorite holiday goodies to share!

Dec 24, 6:30 pm – Contemplative Candlelight Eve Worship – This is a calm and serene service, with Silent Night leading us out for Christmas.

Dec 31 – Carol Sing – For our last worship of the year, come request your favorite Christmas Carols, many of which are in our Presbyterian Hymnal.
