

Book Club



Our next book is A Call to Action, by Jimmy Carter. The subtitle of the former President's last book is "Women, Religion, Violence, and Power", which should fit very well with our ongoing worship series! We'll discuss three chapters per week, starting on 8 May at 6 pm in the sanctuary.

The Sacred Music that Matters to Us

We all have our favorite music that connects us with something holy. In a diverse congregation, it is inevitable that the types of songs that lift one person in prayer will be so different from what inspires another to faith. Part of my job is to pay attention to what 'works' in our community, and plan for us to sing and listen

Sometimes we should try a new hymn; or, other times an old classic is best; and there are plenty of relatively recent songs that seem to be favorites here. Always I try to choose lyrics that relate to the themes of worship, with a variety of tempos and styles. Often I choose songs that someone recommended. And to be honest, there are a few songs I just don't like, so we don't sing those much – the privilege of the pulpit!

Given all that, have you ever noticed when certain songs show up more often? We sing God Rest Ye, Merry People All every Advent, because it's my favorite! But there are several popular Easter songs that we've skipped, because they are just too hard to sing. The most common hymn we have used is Be Thou My Vision, 14 times since I've been here! But some of the other very famous hymns have language that offends some of our members, so I've put them on the shelf. In the Bulb There Is a Flower has been the most sung song from the small hymnal (12 times). But a handful of those songs are—at least to my ears—so sappy and boring, that I just can't handle them. The insert that has been used the most often is Gather Us In (13 times), and there are several I'm looking to work in some day, such as Down By the Riverside and He Walks with Me, which are coming soon, I promise!


In the theology of our tradition, music is a form of prayer. And just as we ask your prayer requests each Sunday, you are always invited to tell me what your musical prayer request.

Children's Videos

In our latest worship series (Behind Every Good Man...) we have been highlighting stories of women in the Bible, who tend to get overshadowed by their male counterpart. The goal, of course, is to show how in God's Kin'dom of peace and justice, women are right beside and often ahead of men. In order to help the children learn those themes, Sara will be showing a video during childcare each week. Along with activities and stories, hopefully this sparks good awareness. You can see all those videos on our Facebook page. Just scroll down the posts, or search on YouTube for these titles: "Gender Equity Explained by Children", "I Will Be a Hummingbird", "Always Like a Girl", "Nike What Are Girls Made Of", "Kids' Assumptions Towards Gender Roles", and "Malala's Magic Pencil". These videos come from Sweden, Kenya, America, Russia, Britain, and Pakistan, but you can bring them into your home, by re-watching them with your kids, and having your own conversations as a family, about women's equality and empowerment.

Children's Bibles

We want our youngsters to grow with the faithful stories that describe holy values, so we teach them here in childcare, Sunday School, and in the children's message during worship. But no matter how well we do at church, those stories and values stick a lot deeper in their souls when they learn them at home. So, starting this spring, on 20 May (and each year subsequent), our youngsters who have graduated Kindergarten are going to receive their own Bible from the church! Parents, you don't have to understand everything about God, to lead them in faith. Just read with them from their Bible, talk about the stories, and connect them to your life and family. (Also, the Session of the congregation will be writing some little notes in each Bible, so kids can find them as they grow and remember this nurturing environment. If you want to sneak in a note around your favorite story, connect with Hansen before the worship service.)

storytelling and Scripture, and
made one CD of American
